Usulan Intervensi

Ladies and gentlemen Distinguished delegates Good afternoon.

- 1. International migrants' workers have been playing an increasingly important role in Indonesia's labour market since the 1980s.
 - → More than 5 million Indonesians have legally migrated to other countries for job opportunities.
 - → The actual number of Indonesian migrant workers is estimated to be higher.
 - → In 2016, we recorded USD 8,9 billion remittances from migrants, which is equivalent to 1% of Indonesia's total GDP.
- 2. Indonesia fully understands the importance of migration statistics in order to improve evidence-based policymaking.
 - → With a better data collection, we may better understand trends and evolving migration patterns, and support the development of evidence-based responses.
- 3. Nevertheless, there is persistent need of more timely, accurate, and integrated data.
- 4. We are fully aware that the lack of rigorous data on migration and remittances is one of the factors behind the limited policy evaluation.
- 5. Improving national statistical systems to measure migration has been a long-winding process, due to:
 - → challenges in data collection,
 - → lack of data integration and empirical research, and
 - → insufficient coordination.

- 6. We apprehend the need to enhance national capacity in migration data strategy, especially in integrating migration and corresponding SDGs indicators into legislation, policies and programs.
- 7. What could we do to improve data migration?
 - → Advancing migration governance, will eventually improve the evidence-based policy decisions related to migration and development;
 - → Enhancing data management through integrating multiple data sources to better measure migration-related incidents;
 - → Increasing formal and informal inter agency coordination mechanisms;
 - → Disseminating migration statistics to broader users, including policy makers and public users; and
 - → Constituting continuous migration data capacity building process.

On International Cooperation

- 8. Indonesia believes that advancing global migration governance, including migration statistics, requires sustained international cooperation and commitment.
- 9. We have signed several MoUs and bilateral agreements, established collaboration with government agencies of other countries, and along with other initiatives, in order to strengthen international cooperation to prevent irregular migration.
- 10. New forms of cooperation could be developed with non-traditional actors, including grassroots organizations, diaspora populations and private sector partnership, that may serve as models for better integration of community involvement in supporting migration governance.
- 11. I would like to end my intervention by underlining that international collaboration on migration is indispensable and key to achieving safe, orderly, and regular migration for all.
