#### Introduction

To support Member States and other relevant stakeholders in preparing for the first International Migration Review Forum (IMRF), which will be held by the United Nations General Assembly from 17 to 20 May 2022, the United Nations Network on Migration (Network) is organizing a series of Migration Dialogues during the period January – April 2022. The dialogues will include four interactive, multi-stakeholder webinars, each focusing on one of the four round tables. The webinars, which will include panels of experts reviewing progress and challenges in implementing the objectives considered by each round table, and will provide an opportunity for Member States and all other relevant stakeholders to discuss approaches towards achieving effective, principled migration governance for the benefit of all.

The deliberations during the webinar will be informed by the draft background note (attached), one of which has been prepared for each of the round tables. The draft background notes will be finalized based on inputs received during the webinars.
