

# AGENDA 2nd Annual Meeting of the UN Network on Migration Date: 15 – 16 December 2020 (VIRTUAL)

14 December 2020

The annual meeting of the United Nations Network on Migration will take place virtually on 15 and 16 December 2020.

The draft agenda of the meeting is structured around: (i) supporting momentum for and visibility around the Global Compact, including on accurate narratives on migrants and migration; (ii) enhancing collaboration including with country and regional migration coordination mechanisms for support and implementation of the GCM; and (iii) identifying emerging challenges and next steps for the Network to improve its support of GCM implementation.

Within these overarching areas and pursuant to the Network's terms of reference, the annual meeting will also be an opportunity to (a) review the Network's progress; (b) review working arrangements and explore ways to further enhance collaboration; (c) identify emerging challenges; and (d) take decisions on the next steps.

The draft agenda reflects the commitment of all Network members to the goals of accountability, inclusivity, and focus on impact. Network members and stakeholders will be consulted in the preparation of the agenda.

This second annual meeting of the Network will be preceded by the fourth Network Executive Committee Principals meeting, scheduled for 14 December, and will include, as part of its agenda, the first consultative forum of the Migration Multi-Party Trust Fund (Migration MPTF).

As the meeting will take place virtually, it will be scheduled over several sessions to make the occasion more manageable and to accommodate as many time zones as possible. A multilingual platform will be used for the meeting.

Each session of the annual meeting will be supported with background/discussion notes.



### **Tuesday, 15 December from 12:30 – 14:30 (CET):**

<u>Setting the scene – successes and challenges in supporting GCM implementation</u>

The first session will include an overview of the Network's achievements and challenges in supporting GCM implementation and gathering momentum around the GCM. This session will also include a review of the Network's working methods. This session will further allow for discussion on how the Network with stakeholder partners can continue the momentum around the Global Compact heading from the regional reviews in 2021 to the first International Migration Review Forum (IMRF) in 2022.

<u>Strengthening collaboration, including with regional and country-level coordination mechanisms</u>

SIDE EVENT: Migration Network Hub soft launch

The adoption of the GCM in December 2018 created an important opportunity to move international cooperation on migration issues forward. One key ingredient to achieving better planning and collaboration on migration is trustworthy evidence and information on which to base migration decision-making, research and service provision. Within this framework, UN Member States called for (through the Capacity-Building Mechanism in the GCM) the creation of a global Connection Hub and Knowledge Platform - the "Migration Network Hub" - that would serve as a repository of existing evidence, practices and initiatives related to migration, facilitating the accessibility of knowledge and sharing of solutions.
