

# Regional Review of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration Consultation with Multi-Stakeholders<sup>1</sup>

#### **Latin America and the Caribbean**

#### **Concept Note**

### Context and background

On 19 December 2018, the United Nations General Assembly endorsed the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration (GCM)<sup>2</sup>, which proposes a cooperation framework to address the different dimensions of migration.

Two years after its adoption, the Member States have begun the review process of the GCM, at the regional level, which will (1) enable Member states to undertake a first assessment of progress made in implementing the GCM within the region, with the participation of all relevant stakeholders; (2) highlight common challenges and opportunities, identify gaps and promising practices, discuss regional priorities and identify the resources required for implementing the GCM; (3) provide a common platform for interaction and exchanging of lessons learned and best practices among all relevant stakeholders; and, (4) facilitate the formulation of key findings and recommendations to inform the 2022 International Migration Review Forum (IMRF).

Considering migration is a part of our everyday reality, and that discussions regarding its governance need to involve as many stakeholders as possible, the GCM invites inter-regional, regional and sub-regional processes, platforms and organizations, as well as all relevant stakeholders in the region, to "review the implementation of the Global Compact within their respective regions starting in 2020" and every four years thereafter<sup>3</sup>. The results of the regional reviews will inform the International Migration Review Forum (IMRF) in 2022 on key trends, challenges, successful practices and emerging issues at the regional levels.

General Assembly <u>Resolution 73/326</u> on format and organizational aspects of the IMRF highlights the importance of the effective participation of all relevant actors to ensure a whole-of-government and whole-of-society approach. The GCM also promotes broad multi-stakeholder collaboration to address migration in all its dimensions by including migrants, diasporas, local communities, civil society, academia, the private sector, parliamentarians, trade unions, national human rights institutions, the media and other stakeholders in migration governance<sup>4</sup>.

#### 1. Participation of stakeholders in the intergovernmental Regional Review Meeting

In order to ensure an inclusive regional review, relevant stakeholders have been invited to provide inputs through a voluntary questionnaire on the implementation of the GCM. These inputs are being uploaded on the website of the United Nations Migration Network (<a href="https://migrationnetwork.un.org/country-regional-network/latin-america-caribbean">https://migrationnetwork.un.org/country-regional-network/latin-america-caribbean</a>) and will be taken into consideration for the Regional Review Report. The final version of the report will be published on the same website in the first half of 2021, and serve as an input to the International Migration Review Forum.

The intergovernmental meeting is due from 26 to 28 April 2021 and will be held virtually due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This meeting will convene representatives of Member States from Latin America and the Caribbean, intergovernmental organizations, UN agencies, funds and specialized programmes, as well as all relevant stakeholders in the region – including civil society and other relevant stakeholders from global, regional and national levels.

Stakeholders will be invited to participate as panelists during the round-table discussions of the intergovernmental meeting.

#### 2. Multi-stakeholder consultation

The Latin American and the Caribbean United Nations Network on Migration (Network) is committed to undertake the necessary tasks to facilitate a broad, genuine and meaningful participation of civil society and all relevant stakeholders in the review process of the GCM.

To this end, a multi-stakeholder consultation is scheduled from 13 to 15 April 2021 in preparation for the Intergovernmental Meeting.

#### a. Objectives of the consultation

- 1) To exchange information on the progress, challenges and opportunities in the region regarding the implementation of the GCM.
- 2) To propose recommendations to enhance progress in the implementation of the GCM; and
- 3) To elaborate a synthesis on the main results of the consultation to be presented in the intergovernmental meeting.

#### b. Organization of the meeting

The consultation will take place over 3 days with a similar structure to that of the intergovernmental meeting. Five round tables will bring stakeholders together to review correspondent objectives. Discussions in round tables will take 2 to 3 hours each to promote participation. Main conclusions will be shared in a closing panel. The opening segment includes remarks by IOM Regional Directors, both from Central America, North America and the Caribbean, and from South America, as well as from the Chief of Population and Development Division-CELADE, ECLAC.



As outcome, a summary of the main aspects highlighted in the consultation will be presented during the opening segment of the intergovernmental meeting.

#### c. Logistics and organizations registration

Participants of the consultation will have opportunities to make interventions from the floor after the round table panels.
