Priority Title: Climate Change, the GCM, and the Paris Agreement

What is the overall objective and value-added of this priority? Which GCM and IMRF Progress Declaration paragraphs does it link to?

This priority aims to align the implementation of the GCM and that of the Paris Agreement and the UNFCCC, in line with GCM Objective 23 and IMRF Progress Declaration paragraph 74, and TFD recommendation 1.(j).

This priority responds specifically to GCM Objectives 2 and 5 on addressing the drivers that compel people to leave their country of origin, including disasters, the adverse effects of climate change and environmental degradation, and on facilitating safe, orderly and regular migration in the context of such drivers. The priority also aims to implement these GCM Objectives in line with the IMRF Progress Declaration paragraphs 12, 13, 24, 27, 59, 70 and 74 and the TFD Recommendations.

What will be the key deliverables/activities, and how will they contribute to GCM implementation? How do they respond to the needs at the field level? Noting that the current Network workplan is for 2022-2024, what is the timeframe for these activities?

How has this priority and its proposed key deliverables/activities been consulted, including with the broader UN Network membership and stakeholders?

The Priority co-leads have held formal and informal consultations with UNNM membership and stakeholders to identify priorities and gaps. States and stakeholders part of the WIM Executive Committee and of the Task Force on Displacement have also been briefed on this priority.

Is this a new or ongoing priority?

This is an ongoing priority in the UNNM since 2021 and it also builds on the work of the UNFCCC Task Force on Displacement under the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change (WIM), established in 2016.

If ongoing, what will be different from the previous workplan?

1. The 2nd workplan of this priority will be aligned and complementary with the 3rd Plan of Action of the UNFCCC Task Force on Displacement. Given that the planning cycles of the UNNM and of the WIM have aligned this year, 2022, there is an opportunity to further align the GCM and Paris Agreement implementation, linking the two workplans/plan of action.
2. The 2nd workplan of this priority is informed by the IMRF Progress Declaration and the Glasgow Climate Pact.

3. The 2nd workplan of this priority will strive towards operational support to Member States, building on the advocacy and research outputs of the 1st workplan, relevant guidance developed in other workstreams of the Network, and of the TFD outputs in the 2 past workplans.

If new, what potential overlaps might there be with other priorities?

This is not a new priority and overlaps are not envisioned for this priority's workplan, but synergies will be created with the work continuing in the regular pathways on migration workstream, and the work on indicators, among others.

What is the suggested membership of supporting this priority? How will the broader UN Network and stakeholders will be invited to join and contribute to this priority? What resources and capacities will the respective co-leads and members bring to the table?

Co-leads: ILO (human resources, expertise, contacts with trade unions and employers, links to MPTF projects), IOM (capacity: human and financial resources, access to IOM's extensive field and policy networks, expertise;), UNFCCC

Membership: FAO (unique expertise and policy networks on food security, agriculture and natural resources management), OHCHR, PDD, UNHCR, UNICEF, WHO, UNODC, UNDP, IFAD, Public Services International (PSI), MYCP/UNMGCY, ITUC, BWI, IOE, CMPD.

How will this priority engage with the Hub, including for the sustainability of this work?

This Priority will collaborate with the Hub to showcase the outputs produced, including the database of policies relevant to human mobility in the context of disasters, climate change and environmental degradation.

How will this priority engage with Member States?

The aim is for the 2nd workplan of the Priority to help significantly strengthen its engagement with GCM Champions.

The 2nd workplan of this priority will strive towards operational support to Member States (capacity building, programmes development), building on the advocacy and research outputs of the 1st workplan, relevant guidance developed in other workstreams of the Network, and of the TFD outputs in the 2 past workplans.

This is contingent on direct support from the broader UNNM work and of the UNNM Secretariat to understand GCM Champions' interests and needs as well as their capacities.

How will this priority engage with country and regional Networks, UN Country Teams and cooperate with Resident Coordinators, to respond to the needs and activities at the field level?

Efforts will be made to better communicate the global UNNM outputs to country and regional networks, and to draw on their work and expertise for further dissemination and roll-out of global outputs.

Is this priority linked to any other inter-agency or multilateral processes? If so, how will the proposed priority ensure synergies and avoid duplication with other processes?

The Priority is linked to the UNFCCC Task Force on Displacement under the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with climate change. The 2nd workplan of this priority will be aligned and complementary with the 3rd Plan of Action of the UNFCCC Task Force on Displacement, given that this year, 2022, the planning cycles have aligned. The co-leads of the Priority as well as most of its members also sit on the TFD, thus being able to ensure synergies and avoid duplication.

Annex: UN Network Terms of Reference

Working Groups

20. The Working Groups will focus on specific issues and be results-oriented, providing technical advice and inputs to the Network as a whole, including by providing tools and guidelines; and through facilitating joint action at the regional and country levels. Their work will be guided by work plans developed in consultation with the Executive Committee and aligned with the overall work plan of the Network.

21. Working Groups, including their focus, composition and chair, will be developed over time as needs and opportunities emerge.

22. The composition of Working Groups will be drawn from Network members and other partners, as relevant. Chairing or co-chairing will be open to all Working Group members.

23. The Working Groups will be reviewed periodically by the Executive Committee, in consultation with Network members, and others as appropriate, at a minimum, every four years immediately after the International Migration Review Forum.
