Dialogue on Global Compact for Safe, Orderly, and Regular Migration (GCM): Implementation and review processes in the East and Horn of Africa

Date 7-9st June, venue: TBC, Nairobi, Kenya

Background

The GCM provides a comprehensive roadmap and policy options for addressing some of the most pressing issues around international migration and gives Member States the space and flexibility to pursue implementation based on their own migration realities and capacities. By creating this cooperative framework on international migration, Member States have developed a common terminology for discussing key migration issues and a blueprint for comprehensive, rights-based migration policies.

In promoting effective GCM implementation, follow-up, and review from Member States, the Champion countries initiative was created in 2020. The Champion countries community has grown in dynamism and in size – now standing at 33 Member States across the globe – 13 in Africa, including 2 from the EHoA, Ethiopia and Kenya. Champions played a critical role in demonstrating support for the GCM, most recently by having galvanized support for preparations for the first IMRF. During this second phase of GCM implementation, Champions have highlighted the importance of using this stateled platform to maintain momentum to advance GCM implementation, including preserving strong partnerships, enhancing collective advocacy, and improving the visibility of their efforts and activities.

In January 2023, an Informal Dialogue on GCM champion countries in the Middle East, Africa and the Europe region brought together technical level representatives from the three regions to take stock of good practices, progress in the implementation of pledges and share plans towards the implementation of the GCM. This event provided a unique opportunity for an open discussion among representatives of the Champion countries to encourage peer-learning initiatives and find synergies to strengthen inter-regional cooperation, including as Champion countries prepare for the next round of GCM Regional Reviews in 2024. In addition to providing a platform for experience-sharing, the Dialogue identified wide-ranging priorities for enhancing progress related to data, assistance to migrants in distress, planning for GCM implementation, climate change, and xenophobia.

Considering the inextricable migration linkages amongst countries in the EHoA, existing mechanisms and platforms established at the global and regional level on migration governance, and the renewed commitment of the countries in EHoA for safe, orderly, and regular migration, the 2 champion countries in the EHoA region have decided to convene the first ever inter-state dialogue on the implementation of the GCM in the region, as part of the GCM Regional Reviews preparatory process.

The dialogue will be attended by senior official representatives responsible for migration/GCM implementation in the 2 champion countries plus countries in the region that established a UN migration country Network: Ethiopia, Djibouti, Kenya, Somalia, and Rwanda; the AUC, EAC, IGAD RECs; and UN Migration Network members.

Objectives

- a) Exchange good practices on implementing GCM objectives in the sub region.
- b) Share experiences on the development of the National GCM Implementation Plans.











- c) Identify trends, emerging priorities on cross border migration related issues.
- d) Discuss preparations for the 2024 Regional Reviews of the GCM.

Expected Outcomes

- a) Good practices from implementing the GCM objectives within the sub region are shared.
- b) Experiences from developing the National Implementation Plans for GCM in the sub region are presented.
- c) Migration trends and cross border migration related priorities within the sub region are identified.
- d) Participants agree on way forward, including but not limited to a common pledge from countries in the EHoA.
