The Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration



First comprehensive UN framework adopted through inter-governmental negotiations to enhance international cooperation in global migration governance.

GCM Vision

- Collective commitment to improving cooperation on international migration
- To **unite** rather than divide
- Common understanding, shared responsibilities & unity of purpose regarding migration
- Making migration work for all



DECADE OF >>> ACTION

UN Network on Migration

The UN Network on Migration

The United Nations system is committed to supporting the implementation, follow-up and review of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration (GCM).

To this end, the United Nations establishes a Network on Migration to ensure effective, timely and coordinated system-wide support to Member States





GCM

UN system support for the implementation, follow up and review of GCM adopted in December 2018.



Network

Consists of 39 entities of the UN system who wish to be a part of it and for whom migration is of relevance to their mandate



Rolled out on global, regional and national level

The Country Network in Albania was established in 2021, co-chaired by IOM and UNRC.

Launch of the MGI

Ensuring government buy-in through a presentation of the process and possible impact of the project.



Data collection and analysis

This is done with the Economist Impact through desk research and key informant interviews to answer all 90+ questions.



Inter-ministerial consultation

Discussion of the findings and identification of ways forward to address gaps.



Publication of the report

The Country Profile is endorsed by the government and published in the Migration Data Portal.

How does the MGI contribute to better migration governance?



Generate a government-wide dialogue on migration governance



Use the findings to inform policy change



Establish baselines to track and report progress on national and international commitments, such as the GCM and SDGs


Key Migration Channels




Key Population Trends




Economic Outlook – GDP Albania


