# Migration & Sustainable Development




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The relationship between migration & development is complex and context-specific.







- Migrants should be included in all targets relating to disaster risk reduction and management, including early warning systems
- Migration should be recognized as a potential climate change adaptation (CCA) strategy and way to build resilience
- Education awareness-raising efforts on climate change should include the mobility dimensions of climate change


## The concept of policy coherence:

*“An approach and policy tool that supports the integration of the economic, social, environmental and governance dimensions of sustainable development across all stages of policy making” - source: [www.oecd.org](http://www.oecd.org)*

### - Policy coherence & the 2030 Agenda:

SDG target 17.4 - “Enhance policy coherence for sustainable development”

- Policy coherence includes **vertical** coherence (between levels of governance) and **horizontal** policy coherence (between sectors of governance). Vertical and horizontal policy coherence are **complementary**.


